From the Pastor...

Friends, I was privileged to go on vacation a few weeks ago with about a dozen of my priest friends. We have been doing this for about seven years at the beginning of August, and it is a great time to relax and share stories about our priestly ministry (and other things!).

It just happened that this year as we gathered, some notable issues emerged in the universal Church. I must say, it was convenient and helpful to have other priests around to discuss these matters and to digest them a little before returning to our parishes.

The first, of course, is the international scandal caused by the issues surrounding (Cardinal) Theodore McCarrick. It was revealed in recent weeks that McCarrick has a long history of predatory behavior that was either unreported or was reported with little action taken by some in the Church. This should be extremely troubling for all of us Catholics that such abuse can go unchecked as a man reaches the highest levels of ecclesiastical rank. It also should reinvalidate our efforts to cultivate an atmosphere of transparency in the life of the Church. As with all moral evils committed by those in the Church, though, we have to keep the perspective that our faith does not depend on Theodore McCarrick, even though he was called and ordained to embody it. Rather, our faith rests on the saving proclamation of Jesus Christ, and thus scandals like this, as tragic and heart-wrenching as they can be, should not destroy our faith in Jesus Christ.

Second, Pope Francis announced a revision to the Catechism's treatment of capital punishment. In the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* published in 1992, capital punishment was deemed morally possible if the state had no other means of effectively stopping an unjust aggressor. However, even then, the Catechism quotes Pope John Paul II who suggested that cases in which this would apply are "very rare, if not practically nonexistent." Pope Francis, further developing this view, has proposed this language to

replace the Catechism's current wording: "No matter how serious the crime that has been committed, the death penalty is *inadmissible* because it is an attack on the inviolability and dignity of the person."

There has been much written on this revision in recent weeks, some suggesting it represents a doctrinal change and some suggesting that it is merely an organic development. I would support the latter view, seeing this change in wording as a "development based on circumstances," not a "change of content." This seems to be a good example of what Cardinal Newman called development of doctrine, rather than as a rupture with the moral teaching of the Church. What Pope Francis seems to be saying is that in light of the changing circumstances of prison development and securely retaining dangerous criminals, the death penalty can not practically be justified. To refrain from this type of retributive justice, according to Pope Francis, expresses profoundly that our dignity does not depend on how much evil we've committed and allows for the ongoing possibility of redemption.

One more point on this topic which might be a bit more controversial. Archbishop Jose Gomez, the Archbishop of Los Angeles, disputed the notion that this revision by Pope Francis changes the moral status of capital punishment as compared to other life issues. He says, "The [Pope] is not equating capital punishment with the evils of abortion and euthanasia. Those crimes involve the direct killing of innocent life and they are always gravely immoral. By definition, the lives of almost all those on death row are not 'innocent.' But showing mercy even to those who have committed evil is how we are called to follow Jesus Christ." Thus, Gomez is arguing that capital punishment is not an issue that involves an "intrinsic evil" even if it is deemed practically obsolete. Setting up this hierarchy of moral issues is quite controversial, but it is worth pondering alongside other commentary on this revision.

Crucifixion Chapel In Honor of Rev. James Bacik



Friends, as I mentioned in a previous bulletin article, we reorganized the daily Mass chapel due to the size of some of the student Masses that were exceeding capacity. In the reorganization, we were able to grow our capacity to 50 seats in the chapel. One of the fortunate consequences of this move was to feature more prominently the Crucifixion painting by artist Adam Grant.

This oil painting of the crucifixion scene, which is now front and center in the chapel, has an amazing history. Adam Grant was born Adam Grochowski in Warsaw, Poland in 1924. When Poland fell into Nazi hands during World War II, Adam was imprisoned at the age of 18 in Auschwitz. There, not only did painting and drawing put bread in his mouth, but would ultimately be the reason for his survival. After being transferred to Mauthausen, his art allowed him to escape the stone quarry, where thousands of prisoners died each week. The camp was liberated by the US in 1945, and Adam

spent 5 years in a displaced persons camp in Germany before he was sponsored to emigrate to the U.S. in June 1950. He lived in Detroit for a time, and then moved to Toledo with his wife Peggy in 1955. He died in 1992 after a successful art career that saw his works displayed at nearly thirty exhibitions in more than five states and a number of other countries.

One of those works is “The Crucifixion” which was commissioned for Corpus Christi in 1976 by the Falvey family. It is an incredible piece that shows the depth of suffering that the artist himself lived in the utter hell of the concentration camps.

I hope you will stop in the daily Mass chapel to see the reorganization, but more importantly to pray before this incredible painting that confronts the evil of the world with the cross of Jesus Christ. I would like to say a special word of thanks to parishioner Barb Torio, who is still friends with Peggy Grant, and who was able to provide me with great information on Adam Grant.
