

Reflect

First Reading

We may be tempted to see the commandments as restrictive and burdensome, but the Bible presents them as liberating. God gives them to Israel after their departure from slavery in Egypt. After leaving physical slavery, God surely would not impose on the Israelites new chains of enslavement. Rather, He presents the commandments as the key that unbinds us for free and flourishing relationships with God and neighbor.

Second Reading

Many Jews considered the idea of a crucified Messiah a kind of contradiction since it would show God's weakness. Many Greeks, who made a sharp distinction between body and soul, considered it the height of foolishness that God as pure spirit would not only take on human flesh but also suffer human death. St. Paul relishes in the fact that God does the unexpected.

Gospel

We have a tendency to want the things of God on our terms, even turning the worship of God into something that benefits our self-interest. By cleansing the Temple, Jesus reminds us that pure and fitting worship of God is its own reward. In doing so, he also teaches us that anger directed at breaches of God's commandments can be justified and even necessary.

Upcoming Feast Days

Monday, March 8 : Saint John of God

Saint John of God had given up on his Christian faith early on in his life when he was a soldier. It wasn't until he was 40 that his sins started to weigh on him.

Saint John was compelled by a sermon given by Saint John of Avila, and later engaged in publicly beating himself for his past sins. Because of this he was committed to a mental hospital. There he had a vision from Saint John who told him to spend his time serving others instead of enduring his own hardships. After this he had peace and started a house where he tended to the needs of the poor supported fully by donations. John's spiritual life attracted many helpers who later formed the Brother Hospitallers after his death, which is now a world-wide religious order.



Tuesday, March 9 : Saint Frances of Rome



Saint Frances had a desire for religious life from a young age, but her parents insisted she marry a young nobleman. After she got married, she found that her sister-in-law also had a desire for a life of service and prayer. The two set out to help the poor. Frances eventually became ill, but this only increased her desire to serve others also suffering. Frances later had a son and daughter, both of which she eventually lost because of a great plague. After this she opened up a section of her home as a hospital. She later formed a society of women not bound by vows dedicated to serving the poor. She continued this until her death.


