## COVID Update

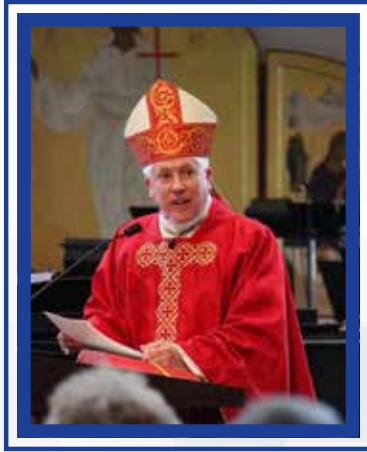
### Starting THIS WEEKEND, June 5-6:

- The dispensation from the obligation to attend Mass is lifted.
  - *Those who have a serious reason, the sick and infirmed as well as those with pre-existing conditions, those who are incapable of physically attending Mass, and those who care for someone who is immuno-compromised are exempt from attending Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation. They should, however, make every effort to watch a broadcast of Mass from their homes.*
- Since the mask mandate will be lifted statewide, masking at Mass is optional.
- Half of our church will be returned to normal seating while the other half will remain socially distant seating.
- Presentation of the gifts by the faithful will resume at the 11 a.m. Mass.
- The sign of peace will resume though the personal preferences of those around you should be respected.
- Reception of the Precious Blood will not resume at this time. (It likely will resume at the start of the fall semester in late August.)
- Reception on the tongue is no longer restricted to the end of the communion line.
- Most liturgical ministers (servers, lectors, etc.) are no longer required to wear masks. Eucharistic ministers are required until further notice.

Certainly, everyone has their opinion on whether "it's about time" for these changes or whether it's "too soon," but let's be patient with each other as we hopefully put this pandemic behind us.

# Welcome Bishop Thomas!

Patronal Feast of Corpus Christi &

## From Fr. Jeremy

It's a blessing to have Bishop Thomas with us at the 11 a.m. Mass to celebrate our patronal feast of Corpus Christi in our 50th year as a parish. Around 107 A.D., St. Ignatius of Antioch said this: "Let that be deemed a proper Eucharist, which is [administered] either by the bishop, or by one to whom he has entrusted it." The high regard the early Christians had for the bishop celebrating the Eucharist in their midst we are blessed to continue here today.

It's also a great gift that Lauren Krieger will be receiving her First Communion. When we started the sacramental program a few years ago, we decided to place First Communion on the Feast of Corpus Christi for the Eucharistic significance. Since Bishop Thomas was going to be celebrating the Mass, I asked her and her family if they wanted a different day. Not Lauren! She wanted First Communion from Bishop Thomas! So we celebrate her today and the gift of this heavenly food.

Here's a [little history of this feast](#) that has become our namesake:

The feast of Corpus Christi that we celebrate today is really the convergence of two separate events in the 13th century. The first is a Eucharistic miracle that can still be visited today in Orvieto, Italy. In 1263, a German priest, Fr. Peter of Prague, stopped in Italy to celebrate Mass on a pilgrimage to Rome. He was having some doubts regarding the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. During the consecration, blood started seeping from the host and onto the altar and the altar linens. This miracle was reported to Pope Urban IV, who was in the nearby town of Orvieto. The pope sent delegates to investigate the incident and to bring the blood-stained host and linens to him in Orvieto, where they are still displayed to this day in the Cathedral of Orvieto.

The second contemporaneous event was a series of visions reported by St. Juliana of Mont Cornillon in Belgium. It had been revealed to her to establish a liturgical feast for the Eucharist. After many failed attempts, she convinced the bishop, who later became Pope Urban IV, to create the feast of Corpus Christi to honor the gift of the Eucharist. Shortly after her death in 1258, the pope instituted Corpus Christi as a universal feast day, and celebrated it for the first time in 1264 in Orvieto, a year after the miracle in the nearby town of Bolsena.

**As we receive Corpus Christi today, may we become Corpus Christ to others.**
