

What are the guidelines for walking the labyrinth?

Enter humbly, recognizing all humans are on the same path, but at different points. Allow courteous spacing if others are ahead walking the labyrinth. Perhaps set an intention or offer a prayer; open your heart. Walk mindfully, pay attention to your inner experience and the beauty around you.

What are the benefits of labyrinth walking?

A labyrinth is used for walking meditation. It is a single winding path from the outer edge in a circuitous way to the center. Labyrinths are used world-wide as a way to quiet the mind, calm anxieties, recover balance in life, enhance creativity and encourage meditation, insight, self-reflection and stress reduction.

What is the center of a labyrinth called?

A labyrinth's walkway is arranged in such a way that the participant moves back and forth across the circular form through a series of curves, ending at the labyrinth's heart or center. It is unicursal, which means that it has only one entrance and leads in only one direction.

Symbolic Meanings

The Labyrinth represents a journey or path to our own center and back again out into the world. Labyrinths have long been used as meditation and prayer tools. When we walk one it serves as a metaphor for life's journey.

How does a labyrinth work?

A labyrinth is a pattern of pathways that weave in a circle around a central point. You walk through the pathways to get to the center. Labyrinths are about the journey, at least as much as the destination. They can be calming, as they slow you down while you wind your way through the path.

Why is it called labyrinth?

The word Labyrinth comes from the Greek labyrinthos and describes any maze-like structure with a single path through it which differentiates it from an actual maze which may have multiple paths intricately linked.

What are the two types of labyrinths?

Labyrinths (unicursal = one path): The earliest types of labyrinths. There are two distinctive basic types (according to pattern): One is the stone-lined Trojaborg-type and the other is the Chartres type. Many labyrinth ground plans are based on one of these two types.

Is there a difference between a maze and a labyrinth?

The difference between mazes and labyrinths is that labyrinths have a single continuous path which leads to the centre, and as long as you keep going forward, you will get there eventually. Mazes have multiple paths which branch off and will not necessarily lead to the centre.

What does the Bible say about a labyrinth?

The word "labyrinth" is not found in the Bible, but themes of following God's way, spiritual journeys, and enjoying God's presence—all central to labyrinth experiences - are found throughout Scripture. Two verses that can be used while praying the labyrinth are, "You show me the path of life.

What is the spiral walking path?

A spiral is movement around and beyond a circle, always returning to itself, but never at exactly the same place. When you walk the spiral, you are walking your unique path of self-discovery. The next step is the unknown place of transformation

What happens when you walk a labyrinth?

It can be used as a tool to "unwind the mind," and to let go stress or worries and concerns. There are hospitals, universities and churches who have installed labyrinths to assist people to come to peace or relaxation. Walking the labyrinth can release patterned behavior, thoughts, and feelings of various sorts.

How to pray with a labyrinth?

Name your intention. Since we embark on a walking meditation in order to hear and respond to the Lord, invite God to walk with you during this prayer period. ...

Walk the path; Enter and follow the path of the labyrinth, knowing that God is with you. ...

Give thanks.

What are the 4 famous labyrinths?

Pliny's Natural History gives four examples of ancient labyrinths: the Cretan labyrinth, an Egyptian labyrinth, a Lemnian labyrinth, and an Italian labyrinth.

What is the most famous labyrinth in the world?

The floor of Chartres Cathedral in France, which remains one of the most-walked labyrinths today, is the most famous Medieval labyrinth.

What religion is the labyrinth?

The labyrinth is a pre-Christian symbol, like adorning an evergreen tree with lights at Christmas or the symbol of the cross. Like these and other symbols, Christians have adopted and embraced the symbol of the labyrinth and in effect, have redeemed and baptized it for Christian use.
